TED (EDWARD OWEN) EDWARDS **1927 - 2016**

We were very sad to hear of the recent death of one of our founding members, Ted Edwards.

Chris James has written the following.

Ted was born and brought up in a beautiful area of Denbighshire, the village of Llanelidan. At the age of eighteen in 1945, he became a member of the Military Police within the British Army. Training in this section resulted in him being in charge of a group in a large area of Palestine during the period of terrorism named "The Jewish Resistance Movement". It was a very traumatic time for British Military members in Palestine, it led to Ted being against the acts of terrorism and he developed a personal involvement in social peacefulness. In 1947, he returned to the UK, left the Military Police and became an instrument maker for the Air Ministry in Shrewsbury.

During his time in Shrewsbury, he met Mair who later became his wife. In 1953, he was transferred to St Athan, lived in Cathedral Road, and later moved to his long term Cardiff home in Cambourne Avenue. Later, he transferred to



the Electricity Board as an electrical engineer and was based at Upper Boat (near Nantgarw).

He retired in 1984 during the period of privatising public industries in the '80s. After his retirement, he used his time supporting his chapel movement and the RSPB. His consistent chapel support led him to become an Elder member at Tabernacle, Whitchurch. Within the RSPB, he organised monthly bird watching walks at Forest Farm on Saturday mornings. Also, he became a voluntary warden at the Forest Farm Nature Reserve which involved numerous tasks.

In 1990, a small group of people involved with Forest Farm, set up the Friends of Forest Farm. At the group's first meeting, Ted became Treasurer and then in 1991 was Chairman until 2005.

As a Committee Member of the Friends, he proposed many projects and became deeply involved in the creation of ponds and bird hides, improvement to paths and the canal embankment.

TED EDWARDS - cont'd

One of his other significant contributions was supporting the bird life on the site. In the early years, there were several new woodlands and as the trees were young, they would not provide a significant number of nest sites. To create the extra ones needed, Ted organised the location and erection of nest boxes with the Warden Mike Wiley. In the first couple of years, over 100 nest boxes were set up and maintained by Ted - assisted by Howard Davies and John Baynham and occasionally by other voluntary wardens. He also began organising the feeding of birds which still continues today. This work resulted in an increase in the number and variety of birds living in the Reserve.

He was also a regular writer in the Friends Newsletter, contributing articles about the nature and history of the Reserve, including the Glamorgan Canal. His activity for the Friends was of great consequence and it was very sad that he suffered a stroke in 2010 which affected him so significantly.

Those of us who knew Ted were saddened by his death; but have very happy memories of his sociability and his great work for the Reserve.

I am sure readers will be interested in an extract of an article by Ted. It was written in October 1991 about the Glamorganshire Canal (see P10).

Whilst walking over the bridge to Radyr recently, I realised how accustomed I had become to the amount of litter on the trees and bushes on either side of the river. The branches are festooned with plastic, paper and rubbish. The amount that ends up in the bay must be phenomenal - I understand a lot of time is spent removing it from the water down there. There is also plenty of litter along Longwood drive and this needs to be collected regularly.

My colleague Paul Pinnell met visitors from New Zealand who were appalled by the amount of litter throughout Cardiff - although they did say that our Reserve was well looked after and generally litter free.

The work on the Melingriffith water wheel has been held back due to bad weather, but has already started.

Recent (feathered) visitors to the Reserve include Bittern, Snipe, Kingfisher, and Little Grebe.

Dr Mary Gillham Data Archive Project

The South East Wales Biodiversity Records Centre (SEWBReC) has been successful in securing a grant of just under £60,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund for a two year project entitled 'A Dedicated Naturalist: Dr Mary Gillham Data Archive Project'.

An estimated 140,000 biological records will be extracted from the archive, with the most important documents being digitized. The project will also inspire the public through a travelling exhibition, a website and social media oral history interviews from people who knew Mary, guided walks, field days and public bio-blitzes, and talks to school and local groups.

In addition, a botany mentorship scheme will be established to train future botanists, two of Mary's previously unpublished books will be e-published, and the future of the archive will be secured through its permanent housing at Glamorgan Archives

All of the outputs will be publicly available either through Glamorgan Archives or through the dedicated website.

Volunteers are going to play an essential part in achieving the goals of this project. With something in the region of:

- 140000 wildlife records to mine out of 20 boxes of assorted papers,
- 14000 slides to digitise (and recover records from),
- 2 unpublished manuscripts to make available digitally,
- an oral record of Mary's life to create,
- a website, social media presence and blog to develop,
- numerous public facing biodiversity events, school/community group visits and guided walks to organise and run...

There is no shortage of tasks!

Volunteers will have the opportunity to complete training in various skills such as digitisation, recording software, oral history recording and archive packaging and labelling. Volunteers will also be supported through any other tasks to which they wish to contribute.

Canal Conservation Management Plan - the environmental survey.



As you will know, the Friends of Forest Farm have long been very concerned about the state of the remaining section of the Glamorgan canal which runs through the Reserve. We offered a financial contribution towards an environmental survey on the canal. The organisation instructed by the Council to carry that out was "frog environmental". Last year, they conducted a range of surveys which would inform the production of a conservation management plan for the canal, and have produced a report. This was presented to the Committee for information in January.

The tasks of the environmental survey were to investigate:-

1. The character of the sediment and de-silting options.
2. The composition, distribution and extent of aquatic macrophytes (plants that grow in or near water - whether emergent, submergent or floating), tree and invasive plants.
3. The Odonata (dragonflies and damselflies).
4. The requirements for bank protection, and suitable techniques taking account of environmental, heritage and archeological constraints.
5. Crayfish.
6. Waterway mammals.

The Committee, and I am sure all the Friends, are very anxious that this will be a catalyst for some action to stop the decline of the canal and improve its biodiversity. We realise that a scheme of this kind will be very costly and would like an application to be made for Heritage Lottery Funding. To this end, we have requested a meeting with the Parks department of the Council and our Councillors to find a way to move forward.

. . . Doing something positive

The weather was not looking promising for our last visit of the season (**November**) at Forest Farm with rain in the air ... I was pleased we had a turn out of five.

The task for the morning was clearing the felled timber and creating two habitat areas - by making open spaces between a group of hazel trees and some mixed scrub. The objective is to create two islands of dense vegetation.

The rain was settling in, so we decided to bring the morning session to an end - but then it eased up a little and we took the opportunity to find some suitable trees to reinstate the nest boxes lost during the felling operation.

A site visit had been arranged to explain the reasons for the removal of so many mature trees by the contractors working for the National Grid. The reasons seem plausible enough, though I am not convinced that such dramatic measures were needed. At the end of the day, the trees have gone, trees that took well over 40 years to grow.

After weeks of rain, it was pleasant to have a dry sunny **January** day for our first visit of 2016 at Forest Farm, Longwood Drive. November saw us abandon our work due to heavy rain, so our task was to finish that job, clearing the timber and selecting suitable branches to make stakes. These will be used to retain the brush and timber barrier as all the cleared timber helps to create a habitat pile which also acts as a barrier to define the path edge.

The morning went well, though I've not seen so much standing water in that area before.

Forest Farm Dairy

"Further to the question in the December newsletter, Forest Farm Dairy was a cafe in Merthyr Rd Whitchurch on (approximately) the site where the Principality BS is now. I remember it when I was growing up and living in Whitchurch in the 1950s, '60s and '70s. It was a traditional and sedate cafe, in the days when there wasn't a coffee shop on every other corner and which offered tea and cakes, before "afternoon tea" recently came back into fashion. The cafe was run by 2 sisters - the Misses Jones. No doubt the restaurant now in Merthyr Rd has been named after them.



I think my late mother may have bought eggs at the dairy but can't be sure. In the fifties of course there were no supermarkets or mini markets. Whitchurch residents bought groceries in the Maypole, which was next door to Birds, which sold fruit and veg. It seems quite plausible that Forest Farm Dairy sold dairy products, in addition to their cafe business.

Note from the Editor

The Miss Jones bar/restaurant in the village does indeed refer to the the previously mentioned cafe - by agreement with the Jones family. They have a leaflet giving some information about the family and the dairy.

Cheryl also referred to the most interesting article on the internet by Thomas Ernest Broad which refers to Forest Farm, and mentions that one of the sisters worked on the farm, 2 other running the cafe. (Other old farms in the Whitchurch area are also mentioned.)

A few people I have spoken to remember the cafe on Merthyr Rd and there has been confirmation that the Misses Jones were running it in the 1930's. It was not thought by them that the Jones family lived at Forest Farm.

There is also a lovely sketch of 'Forest Farm Dairy' cafe dated 1940 by C Hordley in a book by Hilary M Thomas 'Whitchurch - a Brief History'.

I am most grateful to Cheryl for getting in touch and others for their information but am still intrigued about what prompted a local dairy to enter for a French award from the 30th Congrès National des Glaciers de France in 1971. **Does anybody know any more?**

VOLUNTEERING - AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE

Last year, as a result of the cuts to Council funding, I reported on the importance of volunteering for moving forward. The Reserve is in need of much work and with the resources available to the Rangers, volunteering can help to close the gap.

‘The Glamorganshire Canal 1951 - 1991’ - by Ted Edwards

This extract is from the second of three articles Ted wrote on this subject for the Friends Newsletter in 1991.

‘In the agreement between the Cardiff Corporation and Lord Bute on the sale of the Canal, section 31* stated that the Corporation was required to use the canal and its lands lying between Melingriffith and Tongwynlais for public enjoyment. As a result of representations made to the City Council by Cardiff Naturalist Society, supported by other interested bodies, the Council in June 1967, resolved to designate this section of the canal and the adjoining woodland as a Nature Reserve. In 1981, the Reserve, (including the railway cutting) was declared a Statutory Local Nature Reserve (LNR) in accordance with Section 19 of the 1949 National Parks and Access to the Countryside Act.

By today, this section of the canal is full of clean water flowing gently and peacefully, a home to all sorts of creatures and plant life. There is a variety of different habitat types - alder carr, woodland, meadow and scrub, and consequently a rich assemblage of different types of plants and animals. Bird life is abundant, around 90 different species recorded so far. It is an excellent place to introduce young people to the World of Nature and teach them how to understand and enjoy it.’

*(I found this and thought it would be a tribute to Ted and of interest to us now. Do we still have 90 species of birds? * I am pretty sure that it is section 31 - the type is not wonderfully clear on this edition. Ed)*

VELINDRE NHS TRUST

I was recently invited to a presentation by Velindre NHS Trust on their plans for a New Hospital at Whitchurch Hospital as well as the proposed Maggie Cancer Centre.

The site will be in the area that was planned for the replacement Whitchurch Hospital - before it was moved to Llandough. It is the triangular area from Velindre Road to the George Thomas Hospice building.

This is a long term plan which will take up to five years to implement and will transform the lives of their patients as well as their friends and family.

I was also able to undertake a walk around the Reserve with two members of their senior management team to show the important historical and environmental parts of the Reserve.

It was a good opportunity to start with which we hope will be a long term relationship where we will work together to protect the reserve as the project moves forward to completion.
